

# WAADAC Legislative Report

Wednesday was the cutoff for bills to be voted out of their policy committees in the opposite chamber. Bills with a financial impact to the state must make a quick journey through the fiscal committees, with a deadline of Monday, February 26th. After that, the chambers will return to the floor full-time to debate bills until Friday, March 1<sup>st</sup> when they will turn attention to final concurrence and passing final budgets until Sine Die on March 7th.

As the end of session nears, several legislators are making plans to leave the Legislature. In response to the impending retirement of Congresswoman Cathy McMorris Rogers, Rep. Jacquelin Maycumber (R-7<sup>th</sup>) has announced her intention to run for the seat. Rep. Maycumber was first elected to the House in 2017 and serves as the minority floor leader for her caucus.

Rep. Spencer Hutchins (R-26<sup>th</sup>) has announced he will not seek reelection, noting the part-time legislature has taken a financial toll on his business. This will be an expensive swing race for Gig Harbor and the east side of Kitsap Peninsula. On Tuesday, the Lewis County Board of Commissioners voted to appoint Rep. Joel McEntire's (R-19<sup>th</sup>) stepdaughter Lillian Hale to temporarily serve as his replacement while he returns to active service in the Marine Corps reserve. This will begin at the end of session. Hale is studying nursing at Lower Columbia College. While not required, it is customary for a family member to fill in for deployed state officials.

And finally, Senator Sam Hunt (D-22<sup>nd</sup>) has announced his retirement after nearly 24 years in the legislature. Rep. Beth Doglio (D-22<sup>nd</sup>) has indicated she is not interested in the seat, but Rep. Jessica Bateman (D-22<sup>nd</sup>) has announced she will seek it.

House Speaker Jinkins and Senate Majority Leader Billig have announced that the House and Senate will hold joint public hearings on February 27th and 28<sup>th</sup> on three of the six initiatives before the Legislature: I-2113 (police pursuits); I-2111 (state income tax); and I-2081 (parental rights). It's widely speculated that the Legislature will accept these initiatives so they will not go to the ballot in the fall. I-2117 (repeal of the Climate Commitment Act), I-2109 (repeal of the capital gains tax), and I-2124 (opt-out of Washington's long-term care program) will go straight to the ballot.

## Behavioral Health Increases: Both Budgets

### Olympic Heritage Behavioral Health

**Senate:** \$135.9 MILLION NGF-O (2023- 25); \$123.1 MILLION NGF-O (2025-27) Funding is provided to operate 72 beds at Olympic Heritage Behavioral Health.

**House:** \$139 million NGF-O 2023-25; \$139 million Total 2023-25; \$294 million 4-year NGF-O) Funding is provided for the operation of 112 civil beds at the Olympic Heritage Behavioral Health facility, including for the operation of 72 beds by the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) for civil conversion patients and for the community operation of 40 beds contracted by the Health Care Authority (HCA).

### Contracted Staffing

**Senate:** \$31.2 MILLION NGF-O (2023-25) Funding is provided to maintain contracted staffing levels at WSH, ESH, and the Child Study and Treatment Center (CSTC).

**House:** Staffing (\$31.2 million NGF-O 2023-25, \$31.2 million Total 2023-25; \$31.2 million 4-year NGF-O) Funding is provided for increased contracted nursing staff at WSH and ESH.

#### State Hospital Forensic Capacity

**Senate:** \$29.8 MILLION NGF-O (2023-25); \$41.4 MILLION NGFO (2025-27) Funding is provided to operate an additional 30 beds at Western State Hospital (WSH) and 8 beds at the Eastern State Hospital (ESH).

**House:** \$29.8 million NGF-O 2023-25; \$31.1 million Total 2023-25; \$71.2 million 4-year NGF-O. Funding is provided to add 30 forensic beds at Western State Hospital (WSH) and eight forensic beds at Eastern State Hospital (ESH).

#### 1915i Supportive Supervision and Oversight

**Senate:** \$15 MILLION NGF-O (2023-25); \$45 MILLION NGF-O (2025-27) Funding is provided to implement Protective Supervision and Oversight in Adult Family Home settings in accordance with rates negotiated between the Health Care Authority (HCA) and the Adult Family Home Council, and in Assisted Living Facilities. These services, previously referred to as exceptional Behavioral Health Personal Care, are subject to a 1915i state plan amendment submitted to the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) pursuant to legislative direction in the 2021-23 biennial budget.

**House:** \$18.7 million NGF-O; \$55.4 million Total 2023-25; \$78.0 million 4-Year NGF-O) Funding is provided to implement supportive supervision and oversight, and skills development and restoration services through a 1915i Medicaid state plan amendment. Individuals currently receiving behavioral health personal care services in adult family homes and other long-term settings will begin a phased transition to the new services in July 2024. A tiered rate enhancement will be used to compensate providers for the additional costs of providing the new state plan amendment services.

#### Maple Lane

**Senate:** \$15.6 MILLION NGF-O (2023- 25); \$21.3 MILLION NGF-O (2025-27) Funding is provided to backfill loss of assumed federal funding that the Department of Social and Health Services will not be able to receive because the Oak Cottage was determined to be an Institution of Mental Disease (IMD).

**House:** Maple Lane Campus (\$900,000 NGF-O 2023-25; \$9.7 million Total 2023-25 savings; \$12.8 million 4-year NGF-O) Funding is adjusted for the continued operation of the Maple Lane Residential Treatment Facility campus. Adjustments include: 1) backfilling unavailable federal funding assumed for DSHS in the 2023-25 biennial operating budget; 2) savings to account for DSHS delays in opening the Columbia and Chelan cottages; and 3) the removal of funding provided for HCA in the 2023- 25 biennial operating budget to contract for the operation of beds that will now be fully operated by DSHS.

#### Long-Term Civil Commitment Rate Increases

**Senate:** \$20 MILLION NGF-O (2023-25); \$37 MILLION NGF-O (2025-27) Funding is provided to increase reimbursement rates paid to 90-day and 180-day involuntary civil commitment bed providers, provide a rate enhancement for inpatient and evaluation and treatment settings serving complex client, and to increase the number of civil conversion patients served in community settings.

**House:** Community Long-Term Involuntary Treatment Rates (\$19.7 million NGF-O; \$25.5 million Total 2023-25; \$57.4 million 4-Year NGF-O) Funding is provided to increase the rates for freestanding psychiatric hospitals and evaluation and treatment centers that provide civil long-term involuntary

inpatient services to \$1,250 per day. A \$500 rate enhancement may be paid for individuals with complex behavioral health conditions.

### **Senate Budget Increases**

**OPIOID ABATEMENT– \$36 MILLION OPIOID ABATEMENT SETTLEMENT ACCOUNT (2023- 25)** Funding is provided to respond to the opioid epidemic through funding received pursuant to settlements with opioid producers, distributors, and retailers. Programs include providing medications for opioid use disorder in jails, street medicine pilots, community and school-based prevention, access to long-acting injectable buprenorphine, and grants to expand the use of the Icelandic Prevention Model in tribal communities. Funding is also provided to implement provisions of E2SSB 6109 (Children and families) to provide services to families impacted by high-potency synthetic opioids.

**988 TECHNOLOGY PLATFORMS – \$22.7 MILLION BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CRISIS RESPONSE ACCOUNT (2023-25)** Funding is provided to the Department of Health and the Health Care Authority to collaborate and implement interoperable 988 technology platforms as described in RCW 71.24.890(5)(a). This funding is subject to the conditions, limitations, and review requirements provided in section 701 of this Act.

**UW BEHAVIORAL HEALTH TEACHING FACILITY – \$20 MILLION NGF-O (2023-25)** Funding is provided to support the operations of the University of Washington (UW) Behavioral Health Teaching Facility (BHTF), which is projected to open in July 2025. The facility will operate 75 long-term civil commitment beds, 25 geriatric beds, and 50 medical-surgical beds.

### **House Increases**

**PROGRAM FOR ASSERTIVE COMMUNITY TREATMENT (\$13.8 million NGF-O; \$21.8 million Total 2023-25; \$32.4 million 4-Year NGF-O)** Funding is provided for two new Program for Assertive Community Treatment (PACT) teams and to increase the average monthly caseload of 21 current PACT teams to levels established by Washington's PACT program standards. A rate increase is provided for current PACT teams and an assessment shall be conducted on the access of young adults to PACT team services and alternative models for providing wraparound services to this population with a report to the Legislature due on December 1, 2024.

**CHILDREN, YOUTH, AND YOUNG ADULTS (\$8.7 million NGF-O; \$9.5 million Total 2023-25; \$17.7 million 4-Year NGF-O)** Funding is provided for a variety of activities to improve behavioral health services for children, youth, and young adults. This includes funding for a post-inpatient housing program for young adults, funding to increase stabilization services provided through youth mobile crisis teams, and funding for digital behavioral health services for school aged children.

**CERTIFIED COMMUNITY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CENTERS (\$5.0 million NGF-O; \$5.0 million Total 2023-25; \$15.4 million 4-Year NGF-O)** Funding is provided for grants to Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHCs) that received temporary funding from the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to continue operating in accordance with the CCBHC model until the services and funding model can be incorporated into the Medicaid program.
